NOTES.
DAY 0 Stay: Check in to WeBase the night before.
DAY 1 Negoroji path: Between T81 and T82, known as the Sanuki Pilgrimage path. There are many old choseki or milestones along the way. Try to find them as you walk along. Bonsai: Kokubunji and Kinashi are the main production areas of bonsai pine trees in Japan. You will see rare bonsai fields. A visit to Takamatsu Bonsai no Sato is also recommended.
DAY 2 Bike: Rent a bike from Norman at Cycle Shikoku at WeBase. Ritsurin Garden: Enjoy the seasonal views, known as ippo ikkei, meaning that the scenery changes with every step you take. At Hanazono-tei, you can order morning porridge and enjoy the view of the pond from a quiet Japanese-style room. Shikokumura: An open-air museum with 33 traditional buildings and houses in Shikoku, offering a glimpse into the lives of our Japanese ancestors. Yashima: The first national park designated in Japan. From the observatory deck, you can enjoy the view of the islands in the Seto Inland Sea. Udon: Kagawa's soul food. You should definitely try it at least once during your stay.
DAY 3 Maeyama Ohenro Koryu Salon: Has a wide variety of materials related to the Shikoku Pilgrimage, such as osamefuda and nokyocho from the Edo Period. Worth a visit! Astronomical Telescope Museum: Only open on weekends. Exhibits about 200 telescopes in a variety of sizes. You can get a feel for the atmosphere of a Japanese school as the museum was originally an elementary school building. Return the bike: Return it to Norman at JR Takamatsu Station.
